This ties to the undeniable need for increased youth mental health services in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Embracing an Integrated Approach to Care

When our organization was founded as Family Service over fifty years ago, the vision was to provide counseling and emergency intervention to adults, children and families in need 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Through the years, our vision evolved to integrated care—a fundamental shift in how we deliver healthcare services creating a more holistic, person-first experience. This approach not only addresses mental health and substance abuse challenges, but also a person’s social, physical, and environmental health needs. When mental and physical health are no longer isolated, the benefits can lead to positive outcomes:

- Increased access to care
- Enhanced care coordination
- Improved patient experience
- Reduced healthcare disparities
- Cost savings
- Better overall health and wellness

Our Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) in Burlington, Camden, Cumberland, and Mercer Counties funded by SAMHSA exemplifies this model of care by providing a centralized point of contact for individuals with behavioral health and substance abuse challenges. Our multi-talented team brings together doctors, nurses, case managers, therapists, peer specialists, family members, and more to create a seamless continuum of care.

This gives clients access to a variety of services including supportive housing, emergency food access, job training, primary care, legal/financial aid, and others— a one-stop-shop. By embracing the principles of integrated care, we’ve moved beyond traditional boundaries to become one of New Jersey’s most comprehensive and forward-looking human service providers.

# Justice Involved Services

## Bridging the Gap with Law Enforcement

One of the most crucial partnerships that continues to gain recognition is the alliance between behavioral health organizations and law enforcement. Historically, these encounters have been characterized by a lack of understanding and training, leading to unfortunate outcomes. Our goal is to be part of the solution by joining forces with law enforcement to reshape the way society responds to mental health crises.

The Oaks Justice Involved Services (JIS) program in Burlington, Camden, and Mercer Counties specializes in diverting nonviolent mental health consumers from the criminal justice system to appropriate mental health services in the community. With JIS in place, we've seen an increase in resource coordination between mental health, criminal justice, and social services systems.

The JIS team also works closely with the Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) to help improve first responder interactions with persons living with mental health and substance use disorders. Key training elements include educating police on how to handle encounters, de-escalating potentially dangerous situations, and helping officers find ways to cope with the trauma they experience.

Most recently, we expanded services to a new pre-trial initiative with Camden County. The diversion program works with individuals who are incarcerated for a short stay and reenter the community before trial by offering peer support and clinical assessment. Once the program is successfully completed, it often results in a downgrade or dismissal of charges, giving individuals a new lease on life.

The JIS program stands as a testament to the transformative power of collaboration. Bridging the gap not only diverts individuals from the criminal justice system, it offers a path to recovery. Together, we commit to creating a safer, more compassionate society.



### Modern Day Superheroes

*“Well, it’s not like we’re superheroes in the Justice League, but I like to think of my staff as modern day superheroes. The*

*Justice Involved Services team prides themselves in fostering emotional outcomes that lead to lifelong changes. We get to know individuals before they are released from jail which allows us to build a strong reentry plan.*

*Recently, we received a call from the police about a homeless person, diagnosed with multiple mental health disorders, loitering and trespassing at a popular shopping center. After several business owners and shoppers filed complaints, the individual was arrested and faced multiple charges.*

*Our compassionate staff engaged with the individual and linked him to an immediate crisis intervention and long-term plan that involved mental health treatment, medication management, and housing resources. The good news—he is no longer loitering, charges were dismissed, and he is on the road to recovery.”*

# Camden County Schools Partnership

## Meeting the Rising Demand for Youth Mental Health Services

In 2022, local hospital emergency rooms saw about 2,500 school referrals for Camden County students in mental health crisis last year. To help combat the crisis, in September we partnered with 22 of the county’s 37 school districts to form the Wellness Interagency Network (WIN), funded through a two-year federal grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

The partnership gives students experiencing a mental health crisis access to two licensed Oaks clinicians who can perform same-day evaluations, determine if any immediate treatment or long-term care is needed, and sign off on clearances. Services take place in therapist offices to save students from what can be time-consuming, expensive, and stressful ER visits.

The average wait time to see a provider in a hospital setting could be 18 hours or more, creating an even more traumatic experience for children and their families. Hospital visits come with a price tag and often times there is no follow-up care leading to frequent reoccurrences. Students referred for crisis evaluations and clearances through the WIN program will not have to pay for services and can receive one-on-one care.

In the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, the demand for youth mental health services continues to rise. Oaks Program Director Brittany Enright shares, “It is something I feel like is only going to get worse, and we really need to be able to support and provide that quality of care that is so needed for our youth. The system is hard to navigate, and this program makes it a little bit easier.”

### Lila's Story

*Lila, a high school junior, was referred to the Camden School Wellness Interagency Network in October due to her struggles with substance use and self-worth after a sexual*

*assault. Through weekly in-school therapy sessions, Lila is beginning to process the emotions she has been repressing since the episode and is learning grounding practices to help her reestablish a sense of safety within her body.*

*The program has helped Lila harness her creative streak and use her poetry-writing skills as an effective means of self-expression. Lila also began a mural of handprints in the counseling office to symbolize to others that they are not alone in their struggles. Moving forward into her senior year, Lila hopes other students will be inspired to add their handprints alongside hers.*



## Our Commitment to Excellence

At the core of our mission is a commitment to excellence, evidenced by our investment in training and certifications, including Zero Suicide Training and accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF). Additionally, our positive consumer satisfaction data shows the impact of our efforts on those we serve.

### Zero Suicide Training

In 2023 we took a rigorous, proactive approach by including all Oaks employees in QPR (Question, Persuade, Refer) Zero Suicide prevention training. The foundational belief of Zero Suicide is that suicide deaths for individuals under the care of health and behavioral health systems are preventable. This evidence-based approach equips our staff with the knowledge and skills needed to identify and support individuals at risk of suicide.



### CARF Seal of Accreditation

Oaks achieved re-accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) for 40 programs. The accreditation reflects our dedication to continually enhance the effectiveness, efficiency, and overall quality of our programs. Reviewers commented, "Leadership and staff members show a commitment and passion for the services they provide and the organization's mission within the community."

### Client Satisfaction

Client satisfaction is not just a metric, it is a compass guiding our service delivery. We are thrilled to report positive client satisfaction data, affirming that those we serve not only receive the care they need, but also feel heard, respected, and supported throughout their journey with us.

- **90% of adults** expressed general satisfaction with services
- **93% of adults** expressed satisfaction with quality of services
- **100% of families of adults and 96% of families with children** expressed satisfaction with cultural sensitivity
